EDMONTON INTERFAITH CENTRE FOR EDUCATION & ACTION

The Edmonton Interfaith Centre was founded in December 1995 to promote respect, friendship, harmony and understanding between people of various faiths. Our programs aim to help people live together as good neighbors. The Interfaith Centre has lay and clergy members from many different faiths and has about a dozen different religions represented on its current board.

The objective of the Interfaith Centre is to educate its members and the wider community about the diverse religious faiths present in Edmonton. We have a long history of success in developing programs which communicate the importance of embracing diversity. We have implemented a wide variety of projects, large and small, which have brought together people of many faiths to discuss critical issues facing our community. These include lectures, prayer services, dialogues and presentations, and the Centre also works to raise awareness about local and global discrimination and to model a non-discriminatory lifestyle.

On an ongoing basis the Interfaith Centre provides speakers to schools across Edmonton, addressing the diversity of religious expressions found in the community. The Centre facilitates visits

to houses of worship both for children and adults and also coordinates interfaith prayer services throughout the year. We have hosted the North American Interfaith Network (NAIN) Connect conference twice, presented workshops both locally and internationally at every NAIN Connect for over twenty years, and at four Parliaments of the World's Religions.

We are particularly proud of our partnership with the City of Edmonton. Since 2006 we have had a permanent, changing display at City Hall, called "Celebrating our Faiths", full report follows. We have also implemented or created program material for use throughout the community such as the two peace posters created by local graphic designers, a booklet, "Seeking Peace...Visions of Peace from Twelve Faith Traditions", the "Walking Together" curriculum, and the "Faith in the Classroom" component of the "Safe and Caring Schools" booklets used by the Alberta Teachers Association.

The Edmonton Interfaith Centre looks forward to continuing to serve the community through the two arms of education and action.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT PAULINE PAULSON

I have now completed the first year of my term as President of the Board. I, first of all, want to thank Shiraz for steering us so successfully through the NAIN Conference. I am grateful for the opportunity to be a part of this momentous event. I also want to thank the members of the Board for their support and a special thank you to Netta for keeping me on track. I attended as many community functions as I could and, again, am grateful to those who filled in for me when I couldn't be there. This year, we have funds available through the hard work of volunteers at Casinos. We were able to host a film fest in February; begin production of a documentary video about the past, present and future of EICEA as well as looking into supporting projects of other community organizations. I want to thank those board members who have completed terms of office for their commitment to the work of Edmonton Interfaith. We welcome our new members and look forward to getting to know them and working together.

COORDINATOR'S REPORT NETTA PHILLET

What a relief it was last fall to have NAIN behind us, and that it was a success in every way! Throughout spring and summer 2018 it demanded much of my time; we had a paid planner and excellent volunteer committees but the office was command central for registrants and their payments, speakers, tours and programs, paying expenses from two accounts, receipts, Thank You's, and many more details.

Some of the daily tasks of running a not for profit society in twenty hours a week are: completing the Alberta Registries and Canada Revenue Information Returns; applying for the City Investment Operating Grant; issuing tax receipts for donations; receiving and depositing membership dues, donations and sales revenue; tracking membership payments and renewal. Each of our events needs a venue chosen and booked, often needing deposits paid and proof of \$2 million liability insurance provided, speakers to be contacted and confirmed.

In November we had a table at the annual fair trade sale called "Just One World", one of the few opportunities we have talk to the public. Another was just last month when we had a table at the City Wellness Fair, Virginia and Len showed off our "Celebrating Our Faiths" display and shared their enthusiasm for the activities of the Centre with employees from all departments and cultural backgrounds.

Having a casino has added a whole new dimension to the possible scope of our activities. As Kara will tell you in her treasurer's report it made a positive difference in the NAIN bottom line. It has also added a lot to my work - load, working with her to get permission to spend the proceeds (there are very strict guidelines), another bank account to keep track of and statements to prepare.

We remain passionate about doing what we can to remain involved with Indigenous affairs and are looking at Truth and Reconciliation recommendations that we might be able to accomplish. Several years ago I attended workshops arranged by the Aboriginal Commission on Human Rights & Justice on the topic of "Shared Communities: Intercultural Dialogue between Newcomer,

Multicultural and Aboriginal Peoples". This initiative was in response to the fact that some "new Canadians" arrive knowing little about Canadian Indigenous history; they also bring their pre-existing biases, plus can be negatively influenced by those of Canadians already here. I had an example very recently, was talking to a black friend who said, "We were slaves and when we were freed we had nothing, they (Indigenous) have been given everything so why aren't they doing better?" Sadly that is a common misconception. Our idea is to get the Blanket Exercise into mosques, gurdwaras, synagogues, temples, etc. We are perfectly placed for this, almost half of our board are not "new" but they were not born here and, partly through them, we have strong ties to various faith groups.

We were approached by the Sai Baba Centre to hold a Unity Walk for Peace and Love, in response to recent attacks on houses of worship, so we quickly put together a rally on May 24. Over 100 people stood in the rain hearing prayers from eleven faiths as well as songs from the Sai Baba choir and the Raging Grannies. We were pleased with its success and sad that it is still necessary.

On May 26 – 28 Audrey Brooks and I attended a conference at the Vancouver School of Theology on "Religion and Violence". This is a theme we've considered for years and have committed to addressing it this fall.

One of the highlights of NAIN was a river valley walk with Lewis Cardinal; he offered to do it again and we chose the weekend (June 1 & 2) with the 10+ bad air quality warning. Over 40 people were interested, after many contacts, updates, confirmations for each, I had to tell them we reluctantly decided to postpone it.

As often as I can I attend Interfaith Pride Services, events sponsored by the Edmonton Council of Muslim Communities and the Aga Khan Council, the Jewish Synagogues and Federation, Hindu Society, the Jains, Buddhists, Rev. Brooks' Genocide Memorial, etc.
As always I thank the board and members for your support.

TREASURER'S REPORT KARA MURRAY

The financial statements are towards the end of the report. We are grateful for the ongoing support of the Northern Spirit Regional Council of the United Church of Canada, the Edmonton City Investment Operating Grant and the Edmonton Community Foundation which administers our two funds, including the Lavinia Singh Fund for Peace. As well we appreciate the support of many individual donors and faith groups.

CAPITAL REGION INTERFAITH HOUSING INITIATIVE (CRIHI)

AUDREY BROOKS, DON MAYNE & MIKE VAN BOOM | INTERFAITHHOUSING.CA

The Edmonton Interfaith Centre has been a member of the Capital Region Interfaith Housing Initiative since two board members attended the first planning meeting years ago. Pastor Mike Van Boom is the coordinator, Housing Ambassador and editor of The Neighbourly News, where those interested in an overview of some of the interests and concerns of neighbourhoods can keep abreast of current topics.

This Housing Initiative is concerned with building relationships across the city with a view to encouraging them to participate in dialogues about creating affordable housing for those in need. In particular churches are being approached to see if they have land to share and consider partnering with us to build housing there. In September 2018 a successful political rally was held in support of four critical priorities that included:

1. The Portable Housing Benefit; money every month to help with the rent.
2. The need for Mobile Support Workers to help vulnerable populations (including Seniors and low-income tenants) where they are.
3. Strong investments in Permanent Supportive Housing for people with very complex needs including addiction, trauma, disabilities and mental health challenges.
4. A vision of healthy integration of housing help and supports in every community.

Beginning in 2019 we also set out on a new direction, supporting local area networks of faith communities in five southside neighbourhoods. We aim to have these new gatherings of different faiths meeting together, learning together, and working together in their local community to address local needs related to poverty and homelessness.

This year, we hosted our first ever Faith Leader's Build Day with Habitat for Humanity and were grateful for some participants from the Interfaith Centre's network. Working together and learning more about each other is truly very rewarding.

CRIHI holds regular strategy, education and steering committee meetings, to update our processes, and reports on progress made to house the homeless and supports our Welcome Home volunteer visiting program. This program consists of two volunteers who visit with housed persons, go for coffee or a movie and provide social interaction to minimize loneliness and isolation for those who have made changes from the street to their own housing. Others work at the ReUse Centre or the prefab shop, and various faith groups provide lunches for work crews. Rev. Audrey Brooks serves on both the education and strategic planning committees.

CELEBRATING OUR FAITHS NETTA PHILLET

Since 2006 we have enjoyed a partnership with the City of Edmonton, prompted by a comment to Mayor Mandel that City Hall belongs to all citizens, and city hall should reflect the diversity of faiths found here. As always our performers were exceptionally talented: The Young at Heart Jewish Choir; Carrie Day, Acoustic guitar and voice; Roylin Picou and Diana Harrington: Good News in Poetry and Music; and The Strawflowers: Bluegrass and vocal ensemble.

Our Interfaith Advocate Award was presented to Dr. Junaid Jahangir, for his many years championing LGBTQ+ acceptance and support among specific faith groups. Thanks to our stage manager Kimberly Lang, who once again kept things organized, to the volunteers who facilitated the silent auctions, to Elder Pauline Paulson for sharing a First Nations blessing, and Netta Phillet for organization and support for our crew.

Membership in EICEA from all religious traditions is very important to support our claim of representing all faith-based organizations. “Pilgrimage – Journeys of Discovery” Conference Celebrates 30 Years of Interfaith Harmony North American Interfaith Network (NAIN) Connect 2018 in Edmonton, July 31 - August 2
“Make a pilgrimage to a 10,000 – year - old Indigenous Peoples’ sacred meeting site.”

That was the invitation that went out across Canada, the United States and Mexico. In a fractured and increasingly polarized world, interfaith harmony is something to celebrate. The North American Interfaith Network (NAIN) has been building communication and mutual understanding among interfaith organizations and diverse religious groups throughout North America for 30 years. The annual gatherings are an opportunity to share best practices, with each other and the public.

It was a very busy few days. Most events took place at MacEwan University, and keynote speakers included:

In addition, there were dozens of workshops and panels on a wide variety of themes such as interfaith dialogues, the role of faith communities in social issues such as homelessness and domestic violence, Indigenous topics, chaplaincies and pilgrimage in many forms. Afternoon tours

explored places in and around Edmonton that nurture our spirits and foster interconnectedness with Mother Earth, Creator, and one another. We explored worship sites in the inner city, U of A and south Edmonton, walked through thousands of years of history in the river valley, experienced a sweat lodge and discovered the new Aga Khan Garden, a \$25 million gift at the U of A Botanic Garden.

UNITED NATIONS INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELIMINATION OF RACIAL DISCRIMINATION (IDERD) AUDREY BROOKS

On March 21 we gathered at noon in City Hall for our annual commemoration of a massacre of unarmed civilians in 1960 in South Africa. The proceedings were just underway when there was a fire alarm so we processed outside, fortunately not for too long. Elder Pauline Paulson welcomed us to Treaty 6 territory and shared a prayer, greetings were brought by City Councilor Scott McKeen and Acting Deputy Police Chief Chad Tawfik. The program began with the blowing of the shofar by Karen Gall, then an Islamic prayer from Junaid Jahangir and a Christian offering from Don Mayne. We heard Cree poet Naomi McIlwraith, Rev. Brian Kiely spoke on “Racism as a Learned Behaviour”, Manwar Khan told us “Do Not Be a Bystander”, and Malcolm Azania enlightened us about the valuable work of “The Good Fight”. As they do so often, the Raging Grannies were there too with their timely and critical look at current issues.

INVITATION TO THE ANNUAL GENOCIDE MEMORIAL – (JULY 14, 2019) AUDREY BROOKS

Eleven years ago, with the support of the Unitarian Church of Edmonton and the EIC, Audrey founded the annual Genocide Memorial Service, which witnesses and honours people who died violent deaths because of war and other forms of intentional acts against them. WORLD INTERFAITH HARMONY WEEK (WIHW) LEN GIERACH

She has also been honoured by the Indo-Canadian Women's Association, with whom she has served as president and is currently treasurer for a third term. She also edited several publications for them. She has been nominated for the YWCA Tribute to Women of Distinction Award.

Guy W. Blood, *M.Sc., P.Eng.* has been a member of the Baha'i Faith since 1979, after an extensive search of all possibilities of committing to a spiritual path within a religious community. He has been interested in interfaith harmony for many years and demonstrated that interest early on by producing a weekly community television show in the early 80's, titled Unity in Religion. People from all faith traditions were interviewed using questions that focused on the similarities amongst religious traditions, rather than on the differences. That show ran for 3 years on local cable channel 10. Guy has functioned as a structural engineer since graduating from the University of Calgary with a Master of Science degree in Civil Engineering. Work included designing bridges and buildings, providing educational seminars on cement and concrete, teaching at NAIT, and most recently, structural engineering consulting, before retiring in 2018. He has held leadership positions with the United Nations Association in Canada, several condominium boards, the Edmonton Soaring Club, and the Baha'i Faith, and is currently chairman of the Parkland County Baha'i Assembly. Ed; M.Div.*) continues to serve as Unitarian Chaplain at the Unitarian Church of Edmonton, 10804 - 119 Street, Edmonton, celebrating over 30 years in community ministry, with a focus on pastoral care and counselling. She values her service on the EIC board with enthusiastic and dedicated members who work for cooperation and friendship with diverse faith groups and many other service organizations.

Avau Fast was born in Baluchistan, a beautiful region north west of India, during the British colonial period. She grew up in an area replete with different ethnicities. Later in India no matter where she lived there were churches, temples, synagogues and mosques around the railway colony where she lived. Before attending boarding school she lived with her aunt, and every morning as they walked to pick up fresh vegetables from the market, at each place of worship on the way, they would stop to pray. She recalls that she really did not mind as this gave her a few seconds to rest her weary feet. Avau looks upon India as an old multicultural country and Canada as a new one. As a born Zoroastrian she is proud to be a part of the Canadian mosaic; studying and working among different faiths and cultures has always been her interest in life.

Karen Gall In addition to sitting on this board Karen is Vice President of the Canadian Multicultural Education Foundation. For over a decade, she served as Chair of the annual CMEF Harmony Brunch which commemorates the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. Karen continues to assist on the Harmony Brunch organizing committee. Karen is lay leader at Temple Beth Ora, Edmonton's Reform Jewish Synagogue, is a member of the TBO Ritual Committee and a founding member of the Chavurat HaShir singing group. Her informal education includes over 30 years of participating in aboriginal ceremonies and learning from various Elders, locally, nationally and internationally. She says, "I believe Spirit led me so I can fulfill the reason I was born into this world at this time".

Kathie Reith finds serving on the board to be an exciting and interesting opportunity. She works as an educational assistant at Daly Grove School, helping the students achieve their goals. As an active community volunteer she is involved with different causes such as homelessness, food scarcity, being more inclusive in our environments and promoting diversity, among others. Accordingly we have reviewed the TD Canada Trust records, cheques, deposits and bank statements for two accounts:






